2 **MISS GLADWYN:** Good morning, sir. **DJ DOEL:** Hello. Hello. 3 **MISS GLADWYN:** Yes, sir, good morning. It's Bethan Gladwyn from Hugh James, sir, 4 on behalf of the claimant and it's RCT Homes. 5 **DJ DOEL:** And no Mr Lewis? 6 7 **MISS GLADWYN:** There's no Mr Lewis, sir, no. Sir, PC Barry Cradle who's provided an update in this matter has erm, made enquiries this morning. It's 8 9 understood that Mr Lewis is currently wanted under a warrant that was issued out of the Pontypridd Magistrates' Court following an 10 imposition of a 16 week imprisonment in his absence. So - -11 **DJ DOEL:** Oh, I thought it was 12, but never mind. 12 **MISS GLADWYN:** Sir, that was previously, this has happened - -13 **DJ DOEL:** Oh I see, it's another one. 14 - - 9th of - - 24th, sorry, sir, of April, the warrant was issued for his **MISS GLADWYN:** 15 arrest, obviously to be erm, taken to, to prison. Sir, he has had notice 16 of this hearing; may I hand in a Certificate of Service? 17 **DJ DOEL:** Mhmm. I think I've already had a copy of that actually. No I didn't. 18 Right. 19 **MISS GLADWYN:** So, sir, he's not here, erm, sir, clearly the papers have been served 20 upon him, he's had 14 days to act upon them, seek legal representation 21 if he wishes and to make arrangements to either be here, or to advise 22 us of any difficulties in him being here today, and he's done, done 23 none of the above, sir. Clearly the, he hasn't attended this Court for 24 any matter other than the one breach, sir, which he was erm, brought 25 in under arrest, erm and clearly it would seem the reason for his non-26 attendance is the fact that there is a warrant out for him. 27 **DJ DOEL:** That would be a good reason. I mean when he was arrested and 28 brought in last time - -29 **MISS GLADWYN:** 30 Sir, yes. **DJ DOEL:** - - I think he'd been seen in that area but that was it, wasn't it? 31 **MISS GLADWYN:** It was, sir, on that occasion, yes -32 **DJ DOEL:** And it was a different date from what we're [inaudible], yes. 33 - - sir, that was on the 16th of March and he'd been seen in the area by **MISS GLADWYN:** 34 actually, sir, one of the witnesses in this case - -35 **DJ DOEL:** Mhmm. 36

Sir, this incident that we're dealing with it happened in December, but it's clearly more than being in the exclusion area, erm, sir, and that's detailed in the statement of Vicki Pru. But, sir, my before I proceed any further, sir, my, my submission today would be that this matter now proceeds, proceeds today in his absence. The claimants' witnesses are here if you wish to hear from them, and erm, sir, I'm conscious this is only listed for 15 minutes, but there's clearly no challenge to any of the claimants' evidence, sir.
10	DJ DOEL:	Mhmm.
11 12 13	MISS GLADWYN:	Sir, would invite the Court to proceed in his absence to find the allegations proven and then to consider any appropriate sentences after submissions [inaudible].
14	DJ DOEL:	Which is what?
15 16 17 18	MISS GLADWYN:	Sir, in this matter, sir, referring, erm I would refer, in submissions I would refer you to the case of <i>Leicester City Council v Lewis</i> and the ASBO guidelines. In my submissions, sir, this matter is exceptionally serious, he's been in the exclusion area
19	DJ DOEL:	[Telephone ringing] Can I just take that in case he's turned up.
20	MISS GLADWYN:	Yes.
21	DJ DOEL:	Yeah?
22 23	USHER:	[Inaudible], sir, [inaudible] turned up because he'd been over the other Court.
24	DJ DOEL:	It's Lewis. But who's turned up?
25 26	USHER:	Who's turned up there? Hang on, she's going to [pause]. [Inaudible] lack of communication. Mr Doel, I'm on McPhillips.
27	DJ DOEL:	Who?
28	USHER:	McPhillips.
29	DJ DOEL:	McPhillips. Oh a different case, alright thank you.
30	USHER:	Okay, thanks bye.
31 32	DJ DOEL:	That was a previous case, which is also RCT, but RCT and RCT Homes. Go on.
33 34 35 36 37	MISS GLADWYN:	Yes, sir, yes, so erm, sir, given the degree of harm and the fact that he was in the exclusion area, sir, the claimant will be looking for erm, a custodial sentence of, erm, sir, the starting point under the guidelines is 26 weeks, and given the severity of the incident, and, sir, the Court of Appeal guidance in <i>Leicester v Lewis</i> which allows the or the

1 2 4 5 6 7 8		Court of Appeal's guidance is that a 6 month immediate custodial sentence for a breach of an Exclusion Order is not manifestly excessive. Coupled, sir, with the ASBO sentencing guidelines where there has been serious harm caused, which based on the affidavit of Victoria Pru there clearly has been in this case, the starting point is 26 weeks in custody. Sir, in terms of erm, the defendant himself, sir, the affidavit of Barry Cradle sets out his antecedent history. This is not a man of good character.
9	DJ DOEL:	Mhmm.
10 11	MISS GLADWYN:	This is a man who intimidates and threatens women, and this is exactly what he's done in this case.
12	DJ DOEL:	Mhmm.
13 14 15 16 17	MISS GLADWYN:	They're employees of the claimant, and the claimant is, all it's seeking to do is to try and protect its employees from this individual. He's flouted the Order on this occasion, and similarly in March there's Restraining Orders left right and centre in respect of [inaudible] women.
18 19	DJ DOEL:	Yes. Mhmm. So I see him in March because he's arrested for breach; why didn't I see him in December?
20 21 22	MISS GLADWYN:	Sir, the delay in this matter has been because although he was arrested in December for that incident, he was not then produced to the County Court
23	DJ DOEL:	Mhmm.
24	MISS GLADWYN:	following his arrest for the breach
25	DJ DOEL:	Sure.
26 27	MISS GLADWYN:	he was taken to the Magistrates' Court because there were other issues outstanding.
28	DJ DOEL:	Right. And the Officer makes clear
29	MISS GLADWYN:	The [inaudible]
30 31	DJ DOEL:	in his affidavit that whatever the Magistrates dealt with it wasn't this.
32 33 34 35 36 37 38 39	MISS GLADWYN:	Yes, sir, there had been some confusion throughout February/March time, well more in February, as to whether the Magistrates had actually dealt with, with the breach of the injunction and it took the claimants' some time to get to the bottom of that. Because obviously, sir, the claimant could in no way issue these committal proceedings had he already been dealt with, and it just took some time to bottom that out, and obviously then, sir, the claimant has to, has to re-evaluate the case and make a call as to whether, even though it is now three to

1 2 3 4 5		four months later than the incident, whether it is still a matter that should be brought before the Court, and that, their decision on that was yes, this is such a serious incident that has occurred they cannot turn a blind eye to it. He has gone and threatened very seriously an individual who was protected by the Order
6	DJ DOEL:	Mhmm.
7	MISS GLADWYN:	and the whole point of the Order was to protect that individual.
8 9	DJ DOEL:	So I make an Order for his imprisonment and I presumably issue a warrant of arrest.
10	MISS GLADWYN:	Yes, sir.
11 12	DJ DOEL:	And he's in prison, is the then concurrently doing both the Magistrates' sentence and mine?
13	MISS GLADWYN:	That's a matter for you well
14	DJ DOEL:	Is it?
15	MISS GLADWYN:	I would say it's a matter for you, sir, but I think
16 17	DJ DOEL:	I don't think it is, I think it just happens by dint of circumstance doesn't it? Whereas he might one day have been released
18	MISS GLADWYN:	[Inaudible].
19 20	DJ DOEL:	because of the Magistrates' Order he'll have longer to do because of mine.
21	MISS GLADWYN:	He would still have yours, yes, sir.
22	DJ DOEL:	But it must be concurrent.
23	MISS GLADWYN:	It
24 25	DJ DOEL:	I can't say that because it's not the same Court passing sentence, I just think it's as a matter of fact.
26	MISS GLADWYN:	It, it would have to be, sir.
27	DJ DOEL:	Yes.
28	MISS GLADWYN:	I think I agree with you on that.
29	DJ DOEL:	Okay.
30 31 32 33	MISS GLADWYN:	But, yes, sir, the Order would be a Committal Order would be made, but then you would also issue the power of arrest. He then gets arrested, brought back before you and then is immediately taken to custody to serve out the Committal Order that's made.

1	DJ DOEL:	Mhmm. Okay, what are you doing about possession?
2	MISS GLADWYN:	He's not a tenant, sir.
3	DJ DOEL:	Oh, he isn't?
4	MISS GLADWYN:	No, sir.
5 6	DJ DOEL:	Oh, I thought that was a building you had in Taff Street. Oh I see. Was he once or something?
7	MISS GLADWYN:	[Inaudible].
8 9	DJ DOEL:	No, I'm sorry, I got that impression last time I well I jumped to that conclusion last time that he was
10	MISS GLADWYN:	No, sir, he's not.
11	DJ DOEL:	Oh I see. Okay.
12	Judgment given	

JUDGMENT

<u>1st May 2015</u>

DISTRICT JUDGE DOEL:

- 1. I have in front of me an application to commit Mr Lewis, in breach of the injunction made on 8th October 2014. The application has been served on 17th April 2015 (see the Certificate of Service). It was served together with three affidavits of:
 - (i) PC Barry Cradle;
 - (ii) Claire Pru; and
 - (iii) Victoria Pru,

the principle witnesses to the breach itself.

- 2. Mr Lewis has chosen not to come to Court today, or in any way communicate with the Court about any difficulty in coming to Court today.
- 3. The affidavits were given on oath and I therefore am satisfied beyond reasonable doubt that there has been a breach of the Order of 8th October 2014.
- 4. The submissions by Miss Gladwyn on behalf of the claimant are that the appropriate penalty for this serious breach is a six month sentence of imprisonment. I agree with that, and that is the Order that I make.

1 2 3 4 5	DJ DOEL:	 Upon the Court being satisfied beyond reasonable doubt that the defendant has breached the Order of 8th October on 10th December 2014, in the manner set out and the affidavits of PC Cradle and Claire Pru and Victoria Pru. The defendant is hereby sentenced to imprisonment forthwith for a term of 6 months. Costs?
6	MISS GLADWYN:	Yes please, sir.
7	DJ DOEL:	Of have you done a statement?
8 9	MISS GLADWYN:	I haven't, sir. Can we have an Order that costs to be assessed if not agreed?
10	DJ DOEL:	Okay. You normally just ask for Court fees anyway.
11	MISS GLADWYN:	Yes, just go on the Court fees on this occasion please, sir.
12	DJ DOEL:	Okay. The defendant to pay claimant Court fee of?
13	MISS GLADWYN:	It was £155, sir.
14 15	DJ DOEL:	By the erm, 15 th of May. I'll check with the procedure downstairs, but I think I also have to issue a warrant of arrest.
16 17 18 19 20 21 22 23 24	MISS GLADWYN:	I think you do, sir, yes. Sir, my, one other matter is the injunction is due to expire in October of this year. The defendant is, if he ends up serving the full 6 months, although it's unlikely but even if he serves 3 months, upon his release there's only going to be 3 months left to run on the injunction, and I wonder, sir, whether you would be minded, in view of the breaches that have occurred, to extend the injunction by a further year. And also, sir, to include a term that he is not to contact directly or indirectly the two witnesses in this case, Claire Pru and Victoria Pru.
25	DJ DOEL:	Have you done the, have you got the draft?
26 27	MISS GLADWYN:	I haven't, sir, I can get one sent in to the Court, or I can draft one up and pop it back in for you.
28 29 30 31 32 33 34 35 36 37 38	DJ DOEL:	I've provided in the warrant that he's to be brought to Court en route to prison, in case he wants to purge his contempt in some way. Now obviously if you arrest him on a Sunday afternoon he can't do that, so either if you have a choice about when you arrest him make it on a Monday to Friday, between sort of 9:30 and 4:00, otherwise obviously, if it's impractical the moment when you do find him, then so be it really, but erm, I think as he hasn't turned up today that's his choice, but I mean it's appropriate that he has an opportunity to say something about it on the way to prison. [Pause]. And Injunction Order extended to 9 th October 2016, amended as follows: and I've got:- then absolutely nothing because you're going to write it.
39	MISS GLADWYN:	Thank you, sir.

1	DJ DOEL:	But what are you asking me to do?
2 3 4	MISS GLADWYN:	Sir, to make a clause that the defendant does not contact directly or indirectly the witnesses in this matter, namely Claire Pru and Victoria Pru.
5 6	DJ DOEL:	Yes, okay. I imagine it will give them some comfort. In practical terms he doesn't know how to anyway, does he?
7	MISS GLADWYN:	Sir, no, no.
8	DJ DOEL:	Other than when they're in Ty Pennant.
9	MISS GLADWYN:	But I think it gives them
10	DJ DOEL:	And he's not to go there anyway.
11	MISS GLADWYN:	Yes, sir, but I think it gives them some protection
12	DJ DOEL:	Yes, fine.
13	MISS GLADWYN:	then should he see them out and about, you know, for example
14	DJ DOEL:	Yes, I mean
15	MISS GLADWYN:	if they pop into Ponty town centre.
16 17 18	DJ DOEL:	it doesn't matter, but is it implicit in this, he does recognise them and that's why he acted in the way he did, or would it have been anybody had they been there at that particular moment?
19	MISS GLADWYN:	Well, sir, that's a question we don't know the answer to.
20 21 22	DJ DOEL:	Okay. I know you don't know, I'm just wondering if you had an opinion really. I've already I've done what I've done so it's not going to affect my decision.
23 24 25 26	MISS GLADWYN:	I'm just more concerned, sir, that now he's been sentenced to imprisonment that a [inaudible] which he may deem to be at the hands of Victoria and/or Claire that upon his release he may take steps to actively find who they are.
27 28	DJ DOEL:	Yes, fine. Well [inaudible] to the Order, so you don't need to debate it.
29	MISS GLADWYN:	Thank you, sir. Sir would you like me to
30	DJ DOEL:	So where are you going to find him then?
31	MISS GLADWYN:	to do a draft and then hand it back in to you?
32	DJ DOEL:	Yes, please. Where are you going to find him?

1	PC CRADLE:	I'll try his flat first of all.
2	DJ DOEL:	Oh I'd have thought that would have been tried before now.
3	PC CRADLE:	No, not yet, sir.
4	DJ DOEL:	Really?
5	PC CRADLE:	Erm, [inaudible]
6	DJ DOEL:	I meant on the Magistrates' warrant, I mean you must have
7 8	PC CRADLE:	Oh I'm sorry, I don't know what steps have been taken in relation to that.
9	DJ DOEL:	Right.
10	PC CRADLE:	He's not a difficult man to find.
11	DJ DOEL:	No. That's what I would have thought, but they haven't found him.
12	PC CRADLE:	Not yet, sir.
13	DJ DOEL:	Mhmm.
14	PC CRADLE:	I don't know how hard they've been looking, sir.
15 16 17	DJ DOEL:	Well that's [inaudible] I mean often people do get arrested because you have to speak to them about something else, and when you run a check
18	PC CRADLE:	Yes, sir.
19	DJ DOEL:	you find there's a warrant don't you?
20	PC CRADLE:	Yes.
21 22	DJ DOEL:	But I imagine you're taking this as something you're going to sort out yourself, so
23	PC CRADLE:	I'm going to try to, sir.
24	DJ DOEL:	you'll be positively looking for him.
25	PC CRADLE:	Yes.
26 27	DJ DOEL:	Thank you. Alright. Well we should have the paperwork done by lunchtime I would have thought.
28 29	MISS GLADWYN:	Thank you, sir. I would you like me to knock or just leave it downstairs?
30	DJ DOEL:	[Inaudible] oh, erm, hand it in downstairs.

1	MISS GLADWYN:	Downstairs, thank you. I'll do that.
2	DJ DOEL:	That's okay.
3 4 5	PC CRADLE:	Just ask as a process, sir, there's a Magistrates' warrant and this warrant [inaudible] do we come here first before he gets taken to custody?
6 7	DJ DOEL:	Well I've asked on this warrant he comes here first, if that's practicable.
8	PC CRADLE:	Yes.
9	DJ DOEL:	Simply because people should have a chance to <u>purge</u> their contempt.
10	PC CRADLE:	Yes.
11 12 13	DJ DOEL:	And I'd rather he had that opportunity on his way to prison. As far as the Magistrates' one goes, let's suppose he said something that caused me to change my mind - it's unlikely but
14	PC CRADLE:	Yes.
15 16	DJ DOEL:	I don't know what he'd say - you'd still be holding him on the Magistrates' warrant and you'd still be taking him to prison for that.
17 18 19	PC CRADLE:	Yes, I was just wondering for a process from our point of view, if, rather than taking him straight to a custody suite, you know, would I bring him here?
20	DJ DOEL:	Oh I see.
21	PC CRADLE:	[Inaudible].
22 23 24	DJ DOEL:	I'm certainly saying you bring him here before you take him to prison. You might well take him into your custody suite and dispossess him of his belt and wallet and stuff
25	PC CRADLE:	Yes.
26 27	DJ DOEL:	and do some processing, but I'm simply saying before he gets to Cardiff
28	PC CRADLE:	Bring him here.
29	DJ DOEL:	bring him here.
30	PC CRADLE:	Lovely. Okay. Fine.
31 32 33	DJ DOEL:	Yes. I don't want to make life difficult for you but if you arrest him at 8:00 o'clock in the evening you might keep in him Ponty, and perhaps bring him here in the morning.

1	PC CRADLE:	Okay.
2	DJ DOEL:	Yes.
3	PC CRADLE:	Thank you.
4 5	DJ DOEL:	But before [inaudible] when and [inaudible] when you find him. Thank you.
6	MISS GLADWYN:	Thank you, sir, very much.
7	[End of hearing]	
8	DJ DOEL:	[Inaudible].
9	MISS HAYMAN:	Good afternoon.
10	DJ DOEL:	Are they here yet?
11	MISS HAYMAN:	They are here. He's just asked to go to the toilet.
12	DJ DOEL:	Why not?
13 14 15	MISS HAYMAN:	Erm, yes. I've just served the paperwork on him, because the erm, obviously the paperwork was just completed as we got the phone call, sir. Just by chance we saw him as we left his morning.
16	DJ DOEL:	Ah, I see. You had a hand in this.
17	MISS HAYMAN:	Sorry?
18	DJ DOEL:	You had a hand in this?
19	MISS HAYMAN:	Yes.
20	DJ DOEL:	I thought maybe because PC Cradle had gone straight round there.
21 22 23 24 25	MISS HAYMAN:	Well we did initially and we saw the PC, the local PCSO and said obviously just radio in, and he was spotted in Taff Street. So PC Cradle ran round, I wasn't going to run anywhere, and erm, let him do what he needed to do, and then I spoke to him when he was under arrest.
26	DJ DOEL:	Yes, come in.
27	OFFICER OF G4S:	You sit yourself there.
28 29	DJ DOEL:	Have a seat Mr Lewis. Who can tell me what happened in the Magistrates?
30	OFFICER OF G4S:	We got a warrant.
31	OFFICER OF G4S:	We got a warrant [inaudible].

1	OFFICER OF G4S:	We haven't had chance to read it yet, we haven't been there today, so.
2	OFFICER OF G4S:	It's [inaudible].
3	DJ DOEL:	Right, but in short, Mr Lewis has been sentenced to a term.
4	OFFICER OF G4S:	Yes, 16 weeks I believe it amounts to.
5 6 7	DJ DOEL:	That's right. Well that was previously imposed wasn't it? So basically they now having found him just simply confirmed that sentence.
8	OFFICER OF G4S:	Yes. Yes.
9	DJ DOEL:	So he's going to Cardiff anyway, alright.
10	OFFICER OF G4S:	[Inaudible].
 11 12 13 14 15 16 17 18 19 20 21 22 23 24 25 26 27 28 29 30 31 32 33 34 	DJ DOEL:	Well, Mr Lewis [inaudible] in the sense kill two birds with one stone, okay. I dealt with this matter at 10:30 this morning, which was when you were given notice that it was going to be dealt with, and my understanding is that you were arrested subsequent to that hearing not before. So that arrest didn't stop you coming in to the hearing. I am required when I impose a sentence of imprisonment, in open Court, to pronounce what I've done, and that is that today I found that Andrew Lewis was in breach of an injunction made on the application of RCT Homes, dated 8 th October 2014, not to enter the area around Ty Pennant and not to be aggressive or threatening towards their staff, or use abusive language towards their staff. I found that on 10 th December Mr Lewis had behaved in that way, and after hearing submissions from the claimant I decided that the correct punishment for those breaches was 6 months in respect of each breach, but making a total of 6 months not 12. Those details are now sent to the national media and published in various ways. As it happens I did want the opportunity to speak to you before you were taken to prison, and I thought that maybe, because I had the impression that PC Cradle was keen to see this matter brought to a proper conclusion, I did wonder if you may be found today, and here you are, you've now been brought under arrest to the Court and you're going to Cardiff prison for the sentence imposed by the Magistrates, some time ago I think, and they've now, and you've now been found and you're being taken to serve that sentence. Why didn't you come to Court at 10:30?
35	MR LEWIS:	I didn't know.
36	DJ DOEL:	Well
37	MR LEWIS:	I've had no letter [inaudible].
38 39	DJ DOEL:	You were handed, on 17 th April, you were handed the papers in this case by Miss Hayman I think.

1	MISS GLADWYN:	Yes, yes.
2 3 4	DJ DOEL:	And she provided a certificate to that effect, and it was clear on those papers that the matter was listed at 10:30, so I dealt with it in your absence.
5 6	MR LEWIS:	Alright, well all the paper's on top of the cupboard, so I haven't got other dates [inaudible].
7 8 9 10 11 12 13 14 15 16 17 18 19 20 21 22 23	DJ DOEL:	If and when you're back, and you have access to your cupboard, you'll find that that's what it tells you. It includes affidavits sworn by a PC Barry Cradle, and then two members of staff of RCT Homes, a Claire Pru and a Victoria Pru, relating to incidents on 10 th December. In your absence to challenge that evidence I accepted it as it was put in the affidavits. Miss Claire Pru's position is that she considered the abusive remarks you made to her to be a threat to rape her, which is obviously a very serious matter, and that's why I felt the sentence of 6 months was an appropriate sentence. You need to take some advice, Mr Lewis; you need to take advice about two things. One is the fact that the matter was dealt with in your absence, notwithstanding I'm satisfied you knew about it, still it was dealt with in your absence, you need to take advice about that. Secondly, you need to take advice about whether in some way some application could be made to persuade me that the sentence is too severe and should be lessened, or even suspended. That's not a hint, I'm simply saying that those are matters on which you ought to take advice.
24	MR LEWIS:	I went to the solicitors yesterday
25	DJ DOEL:	Well.
26 27	MR LEWIS:	They're all saying that I couldn't get representation because it was County Court.
28 29 30	DJ DOEL:	You can always get representation under legal aid, in the County Court, if you're threatened with imprisonment. So if that's what you were told it was a misunderstanding.
31	MR LEWIS:	[Inaudible] yesterday.
32 33	DJ DOEL:	Well there we are. You've had two different things, you can believe me or not, but I believe you can get legal aid and get advice.
34	MR LEWIS:	I don't know which one to go to, you know.
35 36 37	DJ DOEL:	Well you may find, I don't know, but I suspect in prison there may be access to lawyers in some way. I'm not getting an encouraging look but it's something you should pursue.
38	MR LEWIS:	It's all Family Courts and Civil Courts and

1 2 3 4 5 6 7 8	DJ DOEL:	Yes, this is a Civil Court but you'll find I'll say it one more time, you'll find that when you're threatened with imprisonment then legal aid is available. What I've done is this, I have told the staff to put the matter in my list next Friday at 11:00, alright. So I'm making a space, I can't do it before then, we're not working Monday and my lists are full until then. That's giving you a space in which you can make an application that you think may be appropriate, preferably you having taken advice about what that application might be, okay. So I'm
9 10 11 12 13 14 15 16 17		putting it in my list, I'll make a direction to the Governor to produce you at 11:00 on Friday, but I suggest you get some advice and you get some representation so that you can put your case in the best way possible, alright. For the moment, I made a decision this morning, this isn't an appeal of my decision, it's not a re-hearing of my decision, I'm not changing it. there's a 6 month term of imprisonment which obviously you'll be doing at the same time as you're doing the sentence that the Magistrates have imposed upon you, but I will look at it again, next Friday at 11:00, alright.
18 19 20 21	MR LEWIS:	The last time, the time I was in Court last time in here, the lad outside on the desk, erm, and in the Magistrates Court, and [inaudible] the same day, and erm, [inaudible] why I could get here, and erm, I [inaudible] and he handed it the lad outside and he phoned through.
22 23 24 25 26	DJ DOEL:	Well I'm not sure, the last time you were here you were brought in by the Officers having been arrested, but that related to a different incident on a different date, because I remember you and I having a chat about how you could get from your flat into Pontypridd without being in breach the injunction.

28 29 30 31 32	DJ DOEL:	You just had to cross the road. But that was a different event, okay. This is to do with an incident on 10 th December, it's in the papers, obviously if you get representation, or even if you don't, if there's a request from you the staff will forward copy papers to you in prison if that's what you need.
33 34	MR LEWIS:	[Inaudible] in touch with a solicitor now, cos there's no-one represent [inaudible].
35 36 37	DJ DOEL:	Well I mean the short answer is, I don't know, Mr Lewis, but I can't believe that people in prison don't have a way of getting in touch with legal advice, because it must happen all the time for obvious reasons.
38	MR LEWIS:	It's bank holiday Monday
39	DJ DOEL:	I know.
40	OFFICER OF G4S:	and I've only got till next week.

1 2 3	DJ DOEL:	I know, I know I know. I know. Which makes it an advantage it's not until Friday. But if it's any consolation you'd be there anyway because of the Magistrates' Order.
4	MR LEWIS:	Yes. I was hoping to get it dealt with [inaudible].
5 6 7	DJ DOEL:	Well I did deal with it today, but I'm giving you an opportunity to persuade me to revisit it, but that's next Friday at 11:00, alright. So are you clear about what I've done?
8	MR LEWIS:	Yeah, so you've got to adjourn it for a week.
9 10 11 12 13	DJ DOEL:	I haven't. I've made an Order, I've ordered, I've sentenced you to 6 months in prison, but I've listed it for 11:00 next Friday for any application that you wish to make. I also, by the way, when you look at the papers you'll see that the injunction has been extended for another year.
14	MR LEWIS:	Yeah, I know that.
15 16 17	DJ DOEL:	And it also now refers, particularly to your behaviour towards Claire Pru and Victoria Pru. You may not know them by name, but those are the terms of the Order.
18	MR LEWIS:	I don't even know [inaudible].
19 20 21	DJ DOEL:	Well if you're never rude to anybody you're not going to be rude to Victoria Pru or Claire Pru are you? That's one simple way of dealing with it. Alright. So I'll see you next week.
22	MR LEWIS:	Okay, thanks.
23	DJ DOEL:	Thank you.
