If you have difficulties understanding, please will you</p> <p>8 say, and we can wait for the translator to translate it</p> <p>9 into an appropriate language for you.</p> <p>10 Can I start by asking you where you were born?</p> <p>11 A. Yes.</p> <p>12 Q. Where were you born?</p> <p>13 A. Yes, of course.</p> <p>14 Q. Where were you born?</p> <p>15 A. I was born in Ukraine, in (Inaudible) December 1989.</p> <p>16 Q. Did you grow up in Ukraine?</p> <p>17 A. Yes.</p> <p>18 Q. And when did you move to Paris?</p> <p>19 A. I went to Paris three(?) years ago to start my business</p> <p>20 and family life here.</p> <p>21 Q. What kind of business do you have?</p> <p>22 A. I have my own fashion company. I am doing shoes and</p> <p>23 clothes.</p> <p>24 Q. Do you operate your business solely in Paris or do you</p> <p>25 sell internationally?</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 5</p>	<p>1 Q. Have you ever worked on a fashion or clothing show or</p> <p>2 event in which she may also have been involved?</p> <p>3 A. No, I never work for this fashion designer and I also</p> <p>4 work as a fashion model since 18 years when I was</p> <p>5 working in Ukrainian Fashion Week, maybe 10 years ago.</p> <p>6 Q. Could you explain your answer. Have you ever come</p> <p>7 Anastasia Ivanova professionally in any context at all?</p> <p>8 A. No, I just read about her in fashion magazines and I saw</p> <p>9 her in TV, not more.</p> <p>10 Q. Thank you.</p> <p>11 When did you first come into contact with</p> <p>12 Alexander Perepilichnyy?</p> <p>13 A. It was I think March 2012.</p> <p>14 Q. March 2012.</p> <p>15 How was that contact made?</p> <p>16 A. He was contact me through the date agency. And he</p> <p>17 was -- he would write me things one or two months and</p> <p>18 finally he told me in May 2012 he will come to Kiev and</p> <p>19 he would love to see me.</p> <p>20 Q. Did he initiate contact with you or did you initiate</p> <p>21 contact with him?</p> <p>22 A. He started contact me first.</p> <p>23 Q. You had a profile on the dating site, did you?</p> <p>24 A. Yes, I do -- I am since seven years a private</p> <p>5 entrepreneur in Ukraine and I have a (Inaudible) who is</p> <p>6 working for me.</p> <p>7 Q. Ms Medynska, you may have to speak more slowly, because</p> <p>8 we are transcribing what you say at this end, please.</p> <p>9 A. Okay, since seven years I am an entrepreneur in Ukraine</p> <p>10 and I have a (Inaudible) who is working for me, 20(?)</p> <p>11 people.</p> <p>12 Q. Have you ever worked in Russia?</p> <p>13 A. No, never.</p> <p>14 Q. Do you now do any work for clients in Russia?</p> <p>15 A. No.</p> <p>16 Q. Do you know a woman called Anastasia Ivanova or Ivanova?</p> <p>17 A. It is very common name in Russia and Ukraine and there</p> <p>18 is one Ukrainian designer that is Ivanova, but I don't</p> <p>19 know her first name.</p> <p>20 Q. Have you come across her professionally?</p> <p>21 A. No.</p> <p>22 Q. Have you ever worked for example on a show in which she</p> <p>23 might also have been working?</p> <p>24 A. He told me that he had friends there but his main reason</p> <p>23 he told me was to come to see me.</p> <p>24 Q. When you first met him, how did he appear?</p> <p>25 A.  17 Q. What did he tell you about his work in Moscow?
 18 **A. Not so much. He said that he got some business but he**
 19 **never told me any of the details, any name of the**
 20 **companies where he worked.**
 21 Q. Did he tell you anything about the problems or concerns
 22 he might have about his businesses?
 23 **A. No, never he talked to me about his problems in**
 24 **business.**
 25 Q. Did you know that he lived in London?

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1 **A. Yes, he told me that he live in London.**
 2 Q. Did he say why he lived in London?
 3 **A. He says that he move because it was more easy life for**
 4 **him in London.**
 5 Q. What did he mean by that?
 6 **A. I don't know, sir. It was -- for me, I didn't ask him**
 7 **any extra questions like that. Because I noticed for**
 8 **the moment there was a lot of Russians who live in**
 9 **London, so it was a normal situation.**
 10 Q. Did he ever mention why he left Russia?
 11 **A. No, sir.**
 12 Q. I think in one of the interviews you gave recently you
 13 said that he left Russia because he didn't feel good
 14 about it, can you remember that now?
 15 **A. He says for him it is a much more easy life in London.**
 16 Q. After you had seen him at the hotel, did he say that he
 17 wanted to move hotels at any point?
 18 **A. First, the day when I met him for lunch he was continued**
 19 **to stay in this hotel and when he made me call next day**
 20 **he says that he moved to another hotel.**
 21 Q. Is that the Fairmont Hotel?
 22 **A. It is a hotel near Denieper river, I think -- I forgot**
 23 **the name.**
 24 **So the next day he moved to another hotel, which was**
 25 **quite surprising me and I say, "Alexander, why you**

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1 **change the hotel?" He says he wants to try another**
 2 **hotel, that is it.**
 3 Q. So he didn't give any explanation beyond he just wanted
 4 to move and try a different place?
 5 **A. No, sir, no.**
 6 Q. Did you get the impression that he might be moving so
 7 people didn't know where he was?
 8 **A. No. I thought about him, he like -- he is not so good**
 9 **know Kiev and he want to discover a new place and this**
 10 **hotel was a new five star hotel which has opened.**
 11 Q. How long did he stay in that second hotel?
 12 **A. The next day we have in dinner in a restaurant, not in**
 13 **the hotel where he stayed.**
 14 Q. Did he move hotels again?
 15 **A. No, he not move, he invited had he for the restaurant**
 16 **which was not in a hotel.**
 17 Q. How many days did you see him for?
 18 **A. I saw him two days, the first and second day in Kiev.**
 19 Q. After he left Kiev, how did you keep in contact?
 20 **A. He was make me call nearly every week and he was writing**
 21 **messages for my telephone number.**
 22 Q. So text messages?
 23 **A. Yes.**
 24 Q. Did he contact you in any other way, by email or other
 25 means?

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1 **A. Yes, he contact me through the mail and after this**
 2 **meeting he was call me from two or three different**
 3 **emails and his name was different, not only**
 4 **Alexander Perepilichnyy, he was mentioned the name**
 5 **Sergei Kovalev.**
 6 Q. Why was he using different names?
 7 **A. It was a secret for me too. I think that he want to**
 8 **have some privacy from me and I don't ask him so much**
 9 **questions about that.**
 10 Q. Did you think it was because he wanted to keep his
 11 relationship with you private?
 12 **A. I think so. I think so, yes. He want -- he don't want**
 13 **to talk me so much because maybe it was some person if**
 14 **I now understand, maybe he want to have this**
 15 **relationship like a secret maybe or he don't want that**
 16 **I know about something about him.**
 17 Q. In any of his emails or messages, did he express any
 18 concerns about work or about his safety?
 19 **A. No, never.**
 20 **First moment, he never told me about work, it is**
 21 **only in September he was send me a wrong email, which he**
 22 **was supposed to send to someone Bishkek(?), and it was**
 23 **his mistake, he was send his work mail to me.**
 24 Q. Did you read that email?
 25 **A. Yes, he say he sent it, "Hello Ms Bishkek(?), I need to**

It was very short mail but this</p> <p>2 mail was to send not to me but to another, so</p> <p>3 I understand this mistake which made Alexander and I did</p> <p>4 not reply to this mail.</p> <p>5 Q. When did you next see him in person?</p> <p>6 A. Next time I see him in July or in August in France, in</p> <p>7 Nice.</p> <p>8 Q. Whereabouts did you meet, in a hotel or other location?</p> <p>9 A. Yes, we stay in hotel together.</p> <p>10 Q. Did you stay in one hotel or did you move hotels?</p> <p>11 A. We always stay in the same hotel, the Negresco Hotel in</p> <p>12 Nice.</p> <p>13 Q. Would you repeat that answer, please?</p> <p>14 A. We stayed together in a hotel, Negresco in Nice.</p> <p>15 Q. Did he organise the trip to Nice for both of you?</p> <p>16 A. Yes, he was invite me, he was buying tickets for the</p> <p>17 trip.</p> <p>18 Q. How many days were you together in Nice?</p> <p>19 A. Just three days we stayed together.</p> <p>20 Q. During that time, how did he appear to you?</p> <p>21 A. He met me, he was quite good mood. And we was just have</p> <p>22 relaxing holidays together.</p> <p>23 Q. Did he ever go off and make phone calls on his own?</p> <p>24 A. Yes, he went, when we were to have lunch and dinner, he</p> <p>25 was meant to give some phone calls and he was never</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 13</p>	<p>1 Q. Sorry, he did mention Switzerland but he mentioned it in</p> <p>2 a business context, did he?</p> <p>3 THE CORONER: I thought you said he didn't say --</p> <p>4 A. No, never got --</p> <p>5 MR SKELTON: He never mentioned Switzerland at all, any</p> <p>6 visits to Switzerland?</p> <p>7 A. He told me only after, when we was in Paris he told me</p> <p>8 that he want to invite me to Switzerland after Paris and</p> <p>9 (Inaudible).</p> <p>10 Q. On a separate trip, on another occasion with you? So</p> <p>11 you would go on another trip, possibly to Switzerland,</p> <p>12 is that what he was saying?</p> <p>13 A. What did he look like when he was on the phone, did he</p> <p>6 look stressed or under pressure in some way?</p> <p>7 A. Once I saw him, he went in France to bistro for the</p> <p>8 lunchtime and he went 10 metres on the street and he was</p> <p>9 speak very loud, like he was scream, but I didn't know</p> <p>10 with whom he speak on the phone.</p> <p>11 Q. Could you say that last sentence again, please. You</p> <p>12 didn't know what?</p> <p>13 A. He went 10 metres from the restaurant. He was very</p> <p>14 nervous when he speak on telephone.</p> <p>15 Q. Did he explain who he was talking to?</p> <p>16 A. When he come back, I say, "Alexander, everything is</p> <p>17 fine?" And he say, "Yes, it is just the work".</p> <p>18 Q. Did he say anything else about being under pressure at</p> <p>19 that time?</p> <p>20 A. No, never, sir.</p> <p>21 Q. Did he mention having taken a trip to Switzerland to</p> <p>22 talk to the Swiss authorities about anything?</p> <p>23 A. I think he was eat 21 a French soup and drink red wine. 22 Q. Again, was he drinking a lot at that stage? 23 A. Sir, when I saw him in Paris it was my third meeting so 3 I don't know this person so well and maybe he was very 4 like dynamic businessman or -- and he want to take a 5 drink and more drink for lunchtime but he was a little 6 bit stressful, what I can say about this time, when we 7 have lunch together. 8 Q. Was he making many phone calls or receiving many phone 9 calls around this time? 10 A. I am not remember -- he only just say to me that he was 11 arrive the same day from London he met me. 12 Q. Before when you described him in Nice you said that he 13 went off to make a phone call where he looked like he 14 was speaking loudly and so on. Did he do that kind of 15 thing when you met him in Paris, was he taking those 16 sorts of phone calls? 17 A. No, when we have lunch, I don't remember that he was 18 have phone call for lunchtime when we was together. 19 Q. Did he spill his wine over that lunch? 20 A. Yes, he was put wine on himself. 21 Q. Why did you think that happened? Was he shaking or 22 trembling? 23 A. Yes, little bit shaking in his hands, yes, sir. 24 Q. Did you think that was just his nerves? 25 A. The next day you have breakfast at the hotel, 16 is that correct? 17 A. Yes, it is correct, sir. 18 Q. Then you went out for lunch? 19 A. Yes. 20 Q. Is that to the Fouquet restaurant? 21 A. We went for lunch -- yes, sir, we went to Fouquet 22 restaurant. 23 Q. Can you remember what he ate there? 24 A. No, sir, I don't remember what he eat in Fouquet. 25 Q. 1 **A. Maybe he drink a glass -- maybe he was drink a glass of**
 2 **water and wine, but not so much.**
 3 Q. In your interview you describe having quite a late
 4 lunch; is that correct?
 5 **A. Yes.**

 7 from the staff of the restaurant?
 8 **A. No, it was nearly empty restaurant, there was not so**
 9 **many people inside.**

 17 **his own secrets. That is it. But I never asked him for**
 18 **what he doing that, because the first time with him.**
 19 Q. That afternoon, how did he appear to you? Was he still
 20 stressed or did he seem relaxed?
 21 **A. Sometimes I have feeling that he is somewhere else**
 22 **because he was not very communicative with me and my**
 23 **mood was not so well and we went for the dinner when it**
 24 **was just very noisy restaurant so I didn't have time to**
 25 **speak to him.**

 25 **A. Maybe, maybe he was doing some important mails but it**

 21 a slightly earlier lunch, so everyone is aware.
 22 (Pause).
 23 MR SUTER: She is not back yet.
 24 We will just find out where she is.
 25 (Pause)

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1 We are all here now.
 2 MR SKELTON: Thank you.
 3 Ms Medynska may I just recap on two issues before
 4 turning to my final questions.
 5 You described Mr Perepilichnyy as appearing nervous
 6 to you during the time he was with you in Paris. Could
 7 you say specifically what it was about him that made him
 8 appear nervous?
 9 **A. I think that he have some kind of business and he have**
 10 **some troubles maybe. Because he was very impulse --**
 11 **impulsive and sometimes I was think it is kind of the**
 12 **way of his character, because many businessman they very**
 13 **work a lot and have stresses, and maybe he have some**
 14 **kind of stress with one of his deal but he never ever**
 15 **told me about anything specific his work. So I can only**
 16 **guess that maybe he have stress with kind of his**
 17 **business.**
 18 Q: Was there anything about him physically, for example
 19 about the way he spoke or the way he looked, his hands
 20 for example, which made you think he was nervous?
 21 **A. No, I think he have -- he was very strong man, very nice**
 22 **educated, that his hands were shake. It was -- what**
 23 **I was feel was maybe he have some unsuccessful deal or**
 24 **business and maybe he was worried about some project but**
 25 **I even don't know anything about that.**

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1 **When I was met him in the lunch in George V, I was**
 2 **tried to ask him how is going everything, what you**
 3 **doing, he said that he come to Paris to have romantic**
 4 **holidays and that is it. At the time I was understood**
 5 **that I did not ask him so much questions because he was**
 6 **just to spend romantic day with me and that was it.**
 7 Q: Just going back to how he appeared when he was unwell on
 8 the night of the 9th, you said he looked a little red.
 9 Did he also look like he was sweating?
 10 **A. No, I did not see sweat on him because when he went from**
 11 **bedroom he was changed his clothes and he was maybe use**
 12 **towel, because I don't saw any liquid, any water, any**
 13 **sweat.**
 14 Q: Did he say anything about having had a headache?
 15 **A. No, about headache nothing.**
 16 Q: Did he say anything about feeling weak physically?
 17 **A. No, sir.**
 18 Q: During the time you were with him in Paris, did he at
 19 any stage take any medication of any kind?
 20 **A. No, sir, I did not see any medication and even if his**
 21 **box, personal bag, I never see any medication.**
 22 Q: You didn't see him take any form of pill or any form of
 23 liquid medication during the time you were with him?
 24 **A. No.**
 25 Q: Nor did you see any such medication in his toilet bag or

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1 in the bathroom?
 2 **A. No, never. Never, sir.**
 3 Q: Were you aware of who else was staying at the hotel
 4 while you were there? Were there any Russians, for
 5 example?
 6 **A. Excuse me.**
 7 Q: Were you aware of any other guests at the hotel while
 8 you were there?
 9 **A. No, I never -- I never see him met any friends he know.**
 10 Q: Did you recognise any Russian guests at the hotel or see
 11 any Russian guests at the hotel?
 12 **A. No, sir, I was not seeing anyone -- no Russian guests in**
 13 **the hotel.**
 14 Q: Can you remember seeing anyone who to your mind acted
 15 suspiciously at the hotel or indeed at any point during
 16 the trip in Paris?
 17 **A. When we were staying in Bristol, it was always I saw**
 18 **people in the first floors, like was like bodyguards,**
 19 **concierge, and when we arrived inside the room it was**
 20 **always clean and I never seen/met people come into our**
 21 **room and he never do something to bring us specifically**
 22 **to the room, like house or home service, or something**
 23 **like that.**
 24 Q: After you said goodbye to him in the airport, did you
 25 have any further contact with him?

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1 **A. Excuse me, can you repeat the question?**
 2 Q. After you said goodbye to him at the airport, did you
 3 have any further contact with him by telephone, text
 4 message or other form of communication?
 5 **A. Yes, when he left, to the London and when I arrived to**
 6 **Kiev, I was send him message that I am apologise about**
 7 **my behaviour in London, because I was very cold with**
 8 **him, I was -- I left there in a very bad mood, I was**
 9 **very cold and I said, "Alexander, I apologise for my**
 10 **behaviour and not take it seriously" and I asked if he**
 11 **has arrived well to London and that day I not receive**
 12 **answer for him. Next day I was not contact him and only**
 13 **two days after, I was receiving a call from emergency,**
 14 **from medical centre that says that Alexander is in a car**
 15 **accident and they was asked me who I am for Alexander,**
 16 **because they think I am part of his family and I say**
 17 **I am just a friend for him and this is difficult is that**
 18 **he is in hospital.**
 19 Q. So can you explain who it was who contacted you about
 20 this accident?
 21 **A. So two days after, it was 12 November, I was receive two**
 22 **phone calls with the British number +44, and they told**
 23 **me that Alexander is in a hospital because he went for**
 24 **a car accident --**
 25 Q. Who was it that --

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1 **A. -- and people were --**
 2 Q. Who was it who was calling you?
 3 **A. People were start to ask me --**
 4 Q. Was it a police officer?
 5 **A. As I understand it -- no, it wasn't police, it was**
 6 **people they called me from the hospital. It was people**
 7 **from the hospital, the way they presented themselves.**
 8 Q. Why were they calling you?
 9 **A. They told me that his telephone number is broken and**
 10 **they saw my SMS in his broken phone and they think that**
 11 **I was the last one to see him or the person who he has**
 12 **known and they reaching through my telephone because**
 13 **they saw my contact in his telephone.**
 14 Q. Did they ask you who you were and how you knew him?
 15 **A. Yes, they asked me who I was, who I am and I told that**
 16 **I am a friend of Alexander and they were asking me when**
 17 **I see him last time and I say that I saw him 10 November**
 18 **in Paris and after that I was asking what happened to**
 19 **Alexander, and they told me he went to the car accident.**
 20 Q. Did they give you a name or a location of the hospital
 21 that they were calling from?
 22 **A. No, nothing, nothing. I was very shocked and afraid**
 23 **about this news and I was saying that it is like a bad**
 24 **joke happens to me, you know. I was saying that it was**
 25 **like, you know, like a joke because I cannot imagine**

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1 **what happened and next day I think they was calling me**
 2 **again and they said that who I am, where I see him last**
 3 **time, and I am just again repeat what happened and I was**
 4 **asked: what is Alexander? How is him? And they not**
 5 **reply to me.**
 6 **So I was started to think that this may be kind of**
 7 **joke because the people not tell me exactly what happens**
 8 **with Alexander.**
 9 Q. You had a phone call on 12 November. Are you saying you
 10 had another phone call on 13 November, the next day?
 11 **A. Yes.**
 12 Q. And was it --
 13 **A. Generally I received four phone calls for -- from**
 14 **Great Britain, I received four phone calls.**
 15 Q. One on the 12th, one on the 13th, when were the other
 16 phone calls?
 17 **A. Yes, they was calling me to say that where are you see**
 18 **him, who are you and I repeated a friend of Alexander's,**
 19 **they asked me where he live, I said just a friend, I'm**
 20 **not his family, I not know him so close, I even don't**
 21 **know where he live in Great Britain to give some more**
 22 **information about that.**
 23 Q. When was the third phone --
 24 **A. It looks very strange --**
 25 Q. When was the third phone call?

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1 **A. And it was looks -- the third phone call was next day,**
 2 **13th. 13 November. And it was look very strange for me**
 3 **because when I start to ask how is Alexander they never**
 4 **replied to me.**
 5 Q. You had a phone call on the 12th, you had a phone call
 6 on the 13th, when was the third phone call?
 7 **A. I received two phone calls on 12 November and two phone**
 8 **calls 13 November. And I was reply only in one phone**
 9 **call, 13 November, because they was not replying what**
 10 **happens with Alexander and I was really scared, because**
 11 **I cannot understand what happens.**
 12 **And after that I was sent a mail to Alexander to ask**
 13 **him how is he doing, because these phone calls make me**
 14 **scared but Alexander was not replying to me.**
 15 Q. Was it the same person who called you each time?
 16 **A. Sorry?**
 17 Q. Was it the same person --
 18 **A. I don't know, it was look like it was the same telephone**
 19 **number was calling me. It was +44 and after I am not**
 20 **remember. And I just know it was a number of**
 21 **Great Britain.**
 22 Q. Someone with a British and English accent?
 23 **A. Yes.**
 24 THE CORONER: Did they speak to you in English?
 25 MR SKELTON: With an English accent?

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1 **A. Yes, sir.**
 2 THE CORONER: English language was spoken to you?
 3 **A. Yes.**
 4 MR SKELTON: It is a phone call from England in English with
 5 someone with an English accent but they didn't say who
 6 they were other than they mentioned the hospital? Is
 7 that correct?
 8 **A. Yes.**
 9 THE CORONER: And never told you that he had died?
 10 **A. No, they just told me that he is in a car accident and**
 11 **I was surprised to know what happened, they not told me**
 12 **which situation he is in, they never in fact replied to**
 13 **me.**
 14 MR SKELTON: Prior to Mr Perepilichnyy's death, did anyone
 15 speak to you about him? Before he died, did anyone else
 16 speak to you about him?
 17 **A. No. No one. And I know only him and that is it.**
 18 Q. Did you tell anyone that you were having a relationship
 19 with him?
 20 **A. Yes, they know to my friends that I was date with**
 21 **Alexander and I know about his death 31 December 2012,**
 22 **because I was celebrate my new years with my best**
 23 **friends and they ask me how is your boyfriend with whom**
 24 **you date and by curiosity I was googled his name and**
 25 **I was read in internet that this guy with whom I was**

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1 **date, Alexander Perepilichnyy and he was died in**
 2 **Great Britain. And like that I was very scared because**
 3 **I was understand that the last person who might see him**
 4 **in Paris was me and like that I was know about this guy**
 5 **and before I was really don't know how is his surname,**
 6 **because he was write me from the mailbox like he is**
 7 **Sergei Kovalev.**
 8 Q. Before he died, did you tell anyone you were in
 9 a relationship with him, give anyone else his name,
 10 friends or relations or professional colleagues?
 11 **A. Yes, two of my friends know that I am going to Paris, to**
 12 **Nice, that I met this guy because he was a guy whom**
 13 **I stay in contact like eight months and two of my**
 14 **friends know that I stay in contact with him.**
 15 THE CORONER: Help me if you would, because I didn't
 16 understand. When did you learn that he had died?
 17 **A. I was read it in internet about his death.**
 18 THE CORONER: Yes, when was that?
 19 **A. It was 31 December 2012, it was New Year's Night.**
 20 THE CORONER: Thank you.
 21 MR SKELTON: Is there anything else you can assist the court
 22 with, Ms Medynska, about any threats to
 23 Mr Perepilichnyy's safety or any reason why he might
 24 have died?
 25 **A. That moment when I know him, just like I know him, I was**

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1 **saying that he is a very nice person, very polite, very**
 2 **good educated but after that, what I was reading in**
 3 **press about him I was really scared because he had a lot**
 4 **of articles about this man and many things start to**
 5 **scare me, because I didn't know that he was married,**
 6 **that he had children, that he had business in**
 7 **Switzerland, that he had business in Russia. Like it**
 8 **was here presented in internet so I was really scared**
 9 **about this person whom I know and I was scared because**
 10 **I in fact know nothing about his life, about this man.**
 11 Q. Beyond what you have read about him since he died, is
 12 there any other information that you would like to give
 13 that might be relevant to the circumstances of his
 14 death?
 15 **A. Sir, after two months, in 2013, I was contacted by**
 16 **British police to give the information. To give the**
 17 **information about his death and I was receiving one mail**
 18 **to my mailbox that I will die soon, so I was very scared**
 19 **about that. That somebody is tried to make me scared**
 20 **with such emails that I was going to die, so I was very**
 21 **scared about that.**
 22 Q. Has anyone threatened you at all in the context of
 23 Mr Perepilichnyy?
 24 THE CORONER: You say you received an email saying you were
 25 going to die soon?

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1 **A. No, I was scared one year, I was read articles about**
 2 **this guy and I was think that somebody will contact me**
 3 **for investigation or chargement, but nobody was -- since**
 4 **five years no one was contact me, except only this one**
 5 **mail which they said to me that I will die.**
 6 MR SKELTON: Was that the only occasion on which you had
 7 received a threatening message?
 8 **A. Yes. I receive a message on my mailbox that I will die**
 9 **soon.**
 10 Q. Do you know who that message was from?
 11 **A. This message was sent by Alexander's mail, it was sent**
 12 **through his mail, but the last message, when he left**
 13 **Paris, one week after this phone call, I was wrote to**
 14 **him, "Alexander, how are you? What happened with your**
 15 **health?" And three months after, on this mail, which**
 16 **I was sent by Alexander, I received the mail that I will**
 17 **die soon, through his mailbox.**
 18 THE CORONER: It was a response on the email you had sent to
 19 his address asking him how he was, later you got one
 20 back on the same message saying that you would die soon,
 21 is that it?
 22 **A. Excuse me, sir, we not hear you. Even the translators**
 23 **do not help me to.**
 24 THE CORONER: You sent an email to Alexander asking him how
 25 he was?

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1 **A. Yes, I was send Alexander a mail one week after I was**
 2 **saw him in Paris, maybe around 17 November, to ask him,**
 3 **Alexander, I was writing a mail, "Alexander, I received**
 4 **a call from the hospital that you are in a hospital and**
 5 **was in a car accident, is it true?"**
 6 **I explained that I am very worried about you and can**
 7 **you reply, please. But I was not receive answer, only**
 8 **three months after I receive that I will die and only**
 9 **this.**
 10 THE CORONER: You didn't get an answer for some time, but
 11 when you did get a reply --
 12 **A. No.**
 13 THE CORONER: When you did get a reply --
 14 **A. No, I not receive the answer.**
 15 THE CORONER: No, and when you did get a reply it said that
 16 you would die soon?
 17 **A. Yes. Yes.**
 18 MR SKELTON: Was this the same message that you spoke to the
 19 police about in which you said you were being threatened
 20 with dying of AIDS?
 21 **A. Yes, sir.**
 22 Q. Do you think that message came from Mr Perepilichnyy's
 23 wife?
 24 **A. Maybe.**
 25 Q. But you don't know?

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1 **A. I don't know, but this was sent by his mailbox.**
 2 Q. Did you also receive any message that was insulting to
 3 you?
 4 **A. No, I just received only this mail and that is it. I am**
 5 **not receiving any phone calls, any messages to my**
 6 **telephone.**
 7 Q. You mentioned to the police when you were interviewed
 8 last year that you thought you might have had two
 9 messages, one in which you were insulted and one in
 10 which you were threatened with dying of AIDS. Can you
 11 remember that?
 12 **A. Yes, at first.**
 13 Q. So there were two messages, one in which --
 14 **A. Yes, that's correct.**
 15 Q. One in which someone insulted you, and one in which
 16 someone threatened you with dying of AIDS, is that
 17 right?
 18 **A. Yes, sir. With me it is most impressed when is somebody**
 19 **says I will die. Of course for me it is more impressed.**
 20 MR SKELTON: Yes. Thank you.
 21 Other advocates will now ask you some questions.
 22 Questions from MR FEAR-SEGAL
 23 SIXTH PROSECUTION: Good afternoon, Ms Medynska. I am
 24 asking questions on behalf of Mr Perepilichnyy's life
 25 insurance company.

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1 Can I ask you first about your arrival at the
 2 Bristol Hotel on 8 November. You arrived I think at
 3 about 12.30 in the afternoon; that is right, isn't it?
 4 **A. Yes.**
 5 Q. You met Alexander there at the hotel?
 6 **A. Yes.**
 7 Q. That is right, isn't it?
 8 **A. Yes.**
 9 Q. How did you meet each other?
 10 **A. Yes.**
 11 Q. Did you send text messages to each other or was he
 12 standing there in the foyer of the hotel?
 13 **A. He told me when I was arrived to the hotel that I will**
 14 **text him a message and he will go in first floor to pick**
 15 **me up. So in fact it was happened like that, he went to**
 16 **the first floor to pick me up from the car.**
 17 Q. I see, so when you arrived you sent him a text message,
 18 is that right?
 19 **A. Yes. Yes, sir.**
 20 Q. He received that message and came to meet you, you
 21 assume?
 22 **A. Yes, I remember he went down to pick me in the first**
 23 **floor of the hotel.**
 24 Q. Yes.
 25 You went I think for lunch at the George V Hotel on

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1 8 November; that is right?
 2 **A. Yes.**
 3 Q. Yes. Did you leave the Bristol Hotel very soon after
 4 you had arrived?
 5 **A. Yes, we -- maybe in 30 minutes we left to the Bristol.**
 6 Q. You --
 7 **A. Sorry, after we arrived I was just bring my luggage into**
 8 **the room and after we went to other hotel.**
 9 Q. You didn't eat anything at the Bristol Hotel before you
 10 went to the George V, did you?
 11 **A. No, no, sir.**
 12 Q. You didn't drink anything or buy anything else at the
 13 hotel before you went to the George V?
 14 **A. No.**
 15 Q. That is right?
 16 **A. No.**
 17 Q. Mr Perepilichnyy was the one that planned this trip for
 18 you to Paris, wasn't he?
 19 **A. He told me that he want to invite me to Paris to spend**
 20 **two, three days just with me.**
 21 Q. Yes.
 22 **A. That is it.**
 23 Q. It was him that chose the dates of the visit to Paris?
 24 **A. Yes, I told him which days I will be free and he says**
 25 **these days I can be free and we decide these days**

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<p>1 together.</p> <p>2 Q. When Mr Suter asked you some questions, you told him</p> <p>3 that Mr Perepilichnyy needed to be in Paris at the time</p> <p>4 you met him, that is right, isn't it? Do you remember</p> <p>5 that?</p> <p>6 A. Because when I was -- yes, I remember that very clearly</p> <p>7 because when I was give my first investigation to French</p> <p>8 Captain Laffont from criminal police of France, I was</p> <p>9 having a very long interview six hours or eight hours,</p> <p>10 pardon, and it is the Captain Laffont told me about</p> <p>11 Alexander Perepilichnyy was two days before already in</p> <p>12 Paris. So I know it about criminal police of France and</p> <p>13 Captain Laffont asked me did I know that, did he told</p> <p>14 you something about that, did I met people who he met,</p> <p>15 did I know some people who he know and I say no, because</p> <p>16 Alexander tell me nothing about that.</p> <p>17 Q. I think that is a previous trip he made to Paris. I am</p> <p>18 talking about your trip to Paris with him. That trip</p> <p>19 was on dates chosen by Alexander because, as he said to</p> <p>20 you, Alexander needed to be in Paris on the dates that</p> <p>21 he met you, that is right, isn't it?</p> <p>22 A. He just proposed me these dates and I confirmed.</p> <p>23 I don't -- he never say to me like you says that he need</p> <p>24 to be these dates in Paris, he never told me that.</p> <p>25 Q. Did the French police tell you that Alexander had</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 57</p>	<p>1 the hotel before you, mustn't he?</p> <p>2 A. No, I didn't know about that, when I was give for</p> <p>3 investigation for French police, a French -- a Captain</p> <p>4 Laffont has told me about the bill which Alexander paid</p> <p>5 me for the shoes and bag and that was it, because he was</p> <p>6 asked me what time it was happened and all other bills</p> <p>7 I didn't know.</p> <p>8 MR FEAR-SEGAL: It is possible, isn't it, that he met</p> <p>9 someone at the Bristol before you arrived on 8 November?</p> <p>10 THE CORONER: Of course it is possible.</p> <p>11 A. What he told me is that he just arrived --</p> <p>12 THE CORONER: Sorry, I mean yes is the answer. But I can</p> <p>13 give that evidence, "Yes, it is possible that he met</p> <p>14 someone when she wasn't there to see it".</p> <p>15 MR FEAR-SEGAL: I will move on, sir.</p> <p>16 THE CORONER: We have a limited time I think.</p> <p>17 MR FEAR-SEGAL: Yes.</p> <p>18 I think the French police told you --</p> <p>19 A. Excuse me.</p> <p>20 Q. I'm sorry, did you want to say something?</p> <p>21 A. Yes, I want to say something. When I just arrived to</p> <p>22 the hotel, Alexander told me that he had just arrived</p> <p>23 before -- just a few minutes before me.</p> <p>24 Q. Yes.</p> <p>25 A. He said he even he just wait me because he just arrived</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 59</p>
<p>1 arrived at Charles de Gaulle on the morning of</p> <p>2 8 November at 8.30 in the morning?</p> <p>3 Do you know that? You may not know that.</p> <p>4 A. Yes, yes, this French police told me, yes.</p> <p>5 Q. Can you tell us, how long --</p> <p>6 A. Because the French police was --</p> <p>7 Q. Can you tell us just approximately, how long would it</p> <p>8 take to get by taxi from Charles de Gaulle to the</p> <p>9 Bristol?</p> <p>10 A. I think it takes for 45 minutes to one hour and a half,</p> <p>11 it is a -- it is a question of the traffic. Sometimes</p> <p>12 it takes 45, sometimes one hour and a half.</p> <p>13 Q. Do you know that the coroner in this case has been able</p> <p>14 to look at Alexander's credit card records, some of them</p> <p>15 at least, did you know that?</p> <p>16 A. Yes. Of course.</p> <p>17 Q. Did you know that those records show that at about</p> <p>18 12.30, on 8 November, Mr Perepilichnyy paid a bill at</p> <p>19 the Bristol for, we don't know the euros sum, but it is</p> <p>20 the equipment of about £115. Did you know that?</p> <p>21 A. No. No, sir, I didn't know that.</p> <p>22 Q. I understand. I understand that.</p> <p>23 Given that Mr Perepilichnyy had paid a bill at the</p> <p>24 Bristol for, presumably, something to eat, at 12.30,</p> <p>25 which is the time that you arrived, he must have been at</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 58</p>	<p>1 at the same time.</p> <p>2 Q. Yes.</p> <p>3 If he had met someone before you arrived, he didn't</p> <p>4 tell you about that?</p> <p>5 A. No, he just say that he just arrived just before me.</p> <p>6 Q. The French police told you, I think, that there were</p> <p>7 some other Russians staying at the hotel at the same</p> <p>8 time but I think you told Mr Skelton that you didn't</p> <p>9 know any of them? That is right, isn't it?</p> <p>10 A. No, no, sir, he just says that he have a business and he 3 never either tell me what kind of business. 4 Q. I think you told the French police that you didn't think 5 that was in the Slav character -- that is the 6 translation I have, I hope that is the right way of 7 putting it.
