### **Role of the Civil Justice Council**

The CJC is an Advisory Public Body which was established under the Civil Procedure Act 1997 with responsibility for overseeing and advising on improvements to the civil justice system.

The Council meets at least four times a year. We provide advice to the Lord Chancellor, the Judiciary and Civil Procedure Rule Committee on the effectiveness of aspects of the civil justice system, and make recommendations on changes to develop it.

## Freedom of Information Act 2000

The Freedom of Information (FOI) Act 2000 (the Act) establishes a general right of access to all types of recorded information held by public authorities.

On making a request for information under the Act you are entitled to be informed in writing by the Council whether it holds information of the description requested and have that information communicated to you.

The Civil Justice Council must respond promptly within 20 working days unless the information sought is subject to one of 24 exemptions recorded by the Act. The Information Commissioner's Office provides an avenue for appeal should the applicant feel their request has not been dealt with satisfactorily.

A fee may be charged for processing Freedom of Information requests although most requests will be free.

#### **Publication Scheme**

The Civil Justice Council operates a publication scheme and this document lists the classes of information and documents that are routinely published and the manner in which they are published. Single copies of all publications in this scheme are provided free of charge. Requests for multiple copies may accrue a printing or copying charge, depending on the number, type and quantity.

The Publication Scheme is regularly reviewed.

## **Responsibility for the Publication Scheme**

Peter Farr (Secretary of the Council) has overall responsibility for the Civil Justice Council's Publication Scheme.
