Although Employment Tribunals are used to dealing with unrepresented parties, many cases are more complex then they may seem. The tribunal staff and Judges will do what they can to ensure your case is given a fair hearing, however, we cannot give you legal advice.

Some offer legal advice, some may represent you at the hearing, and some only offer emotional or practical support. The websites explain what kind of help can be given.
